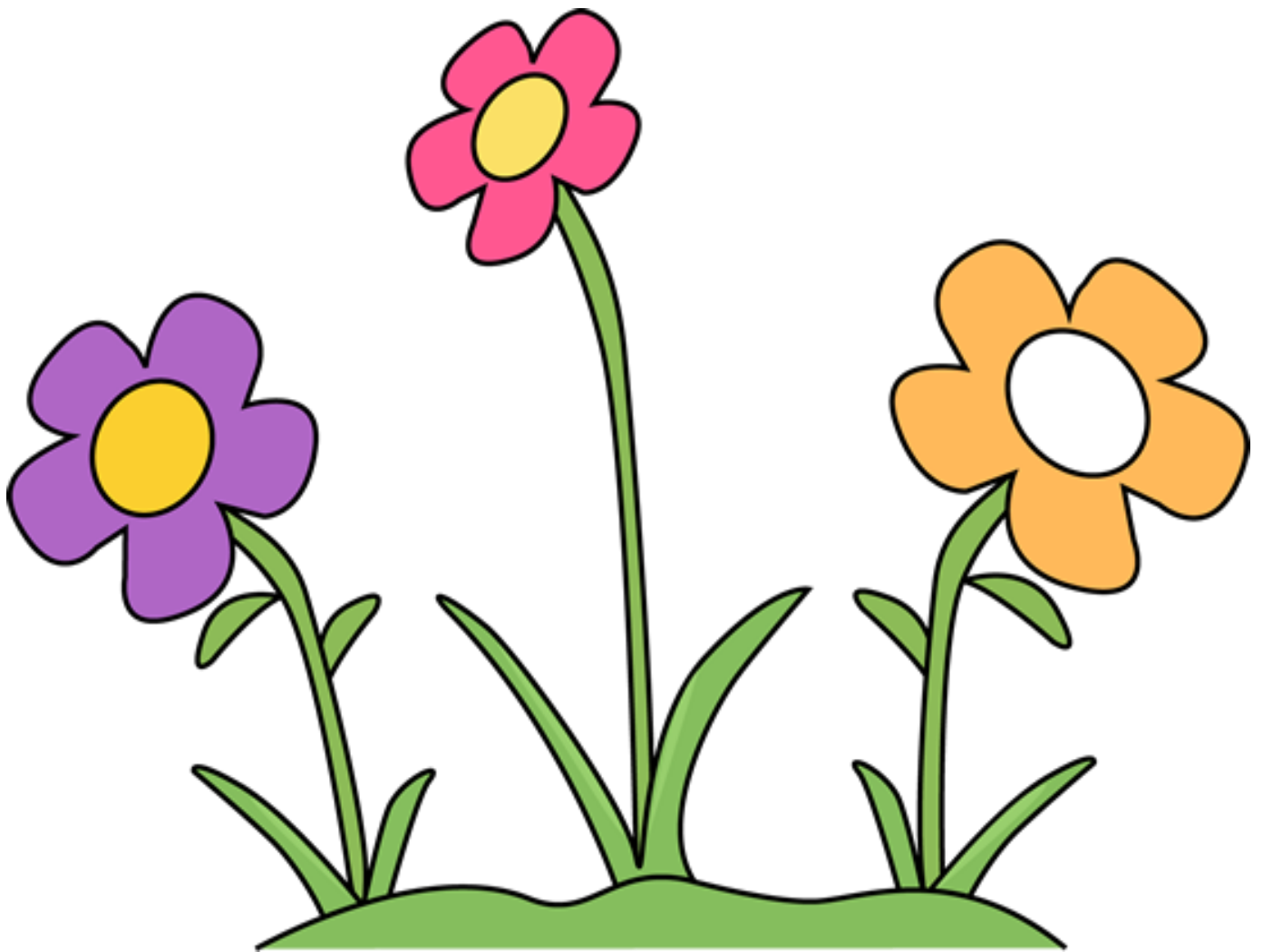

Dear Friends

April, this year brings us to Holy week and Easter (13th - 20th April) and our thoughts are pointed towards the crucifixion and resurrection. Approaching Easter in 1944, the theologian and pastor, Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote in a letter from his prison cell 'Easter? We're paying more attention to dying than to death. We're more concerned to get over the act of dying than to overcome death. Socrates mastered the art of dying; Christ overcame death as the 'last enemy'.... It's not from the art of dying, but from the resurrection that a new and purifying wind can blow through our present world '.

At that time dying was a real possibility for Bonhoeffer: just over a year later he was hanged in Flossenbürg prison camp. But in those dark days Bonhoeffer saw in the resurrection not only hope for himself but for the whole world.

The resurrection of Jesus was not an evasion of death; it followed on from his death on the cross on Good Friday. From what we know of the Crucifixion, there was nothing artistic about it; it was not a 'good death'. Socrates chose his own death by drinking a cup of hemlock He died a dignified and noble death. There was nothing dignified and noble about Jesus' death; it was brutal and painful.

On Good Friday Jesus plumbed the depth of human pain, suffering and despair. On Easter Day that pain, suffering and despair were turned around and transformed into joy, hope and life. It was not just a matter of putting together the broken and battered body of Jesus. The risen Jesus dies no more. He is the first-born of a new creation

In the crucifixion and resurrection we see the creative love of God at work in the depths of human existence, that there is no part his love cannot penetrate. In all the little deaths that make up our lives - the death of hopes, or relationships, God is present, raising us up. He is transforming us and recreating us. This doesn't soften the hurts, pains and sufferings - resurrection only comes after death.

Even after his resurrection Jesus still bore the marks of his suffering; the nail holes and the spear wound. It does mean, though, that whatever world may throw at us we cannot be separated from the love of God. Bonhoeffer goes on in his letter It is not from the art of dying, but from the resurrection of Christ, that a new and purifying wind can blow throughout the world... if a few people believed that and acted on it in their daily lives, a great deal would be changed. To live in the light of the resurrection that is what Easter means. There is certainly a lot in our world that needs changing!

Wishing you ever joy and blessing this Easter

A Parish Council meeting was held on Monday 10th March 2025. In attendance were our County Councillor, Henry Batchelor and our District Councillor Geoff Harvey; 2 parishioners attended.

**Public participation** – No questions.

The application to develop **Kingsway Solar Farm** is still expected in Autumn 2025; it will be formally consulted upon and decided by the Planning Inspectorate. More information can be found at <https://national-infrastructure-consenting.planninginspectorate.gov.uk/projects/EN010165> with an action group from affected communities at <https://kingswaysolarcommunityaction.co.uk/>.

This application could potentially be affected by the government's land use framework consultation. This intends to provide a rational framework for land use and encourage shared, multifunctional land use in future. The consultation is at <https://consult.defra.gov.uk/land-use-framework/land-use-consultation/> and closes on April 25<sup>th</sup>.

It is not expected that Cambridgeshire will be re-organised under the governments drive to create Unitary Authorities but we await the government's decision on future local structures.

The District and County Councils have agreed their budgets for 2025-26 resulting in a 4.99% increase in council tax for the County and a 2.99% increase for the District Council.

**Planning** –We understand Suffolk County Council will hear the proposed **Acorn Biodigester plant – Spring Grove Farm (Withersfield Parish) SCC/0045/23SE** application on 24<sup>th</sup> April. We have submitted our objections which are on the Horseheath website. In total there were over 630 objections.

**Planning enforcement** – we await updates with regard to the College Farm two storey extension and the field on the A1307 containing caravans.

**Horseheath Village Community Association** – We understand the Village Hall is seeking quotes for the clearance of the playground in advance of it being refurbished. The Village Hall is planning a VE day lunch on Monday May 5<sup>th</sup>. Watch out for more details. We are still waiting for the legal transfer of the patio area from South Cambridgeshire District Council to HVCA and a lease on the field behind which will be held by the Parish Council.

**The Bus Shelters at Alington Terrace on the A1307** - We have been seeking to have these repaired but we have been told the bus shelters need to be replaced entirely. To do this there will need to be traffic

management on the A1307 which will be expensive. We are talking to the various agencies about how these bus shelters can be replaced and the safety of the stop improved.

**Neighbourhood Plan** The group met recently and have revised the timetable to produce the plan. We continue to look for a new coordinator to help with the administration of the group as well as new members – please contact John Howard if you are interested. The next meetings will be on Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> April and the 8<sup>th</sup> May.

**Moving Vehicle Activated sign** – Our vandalised speed sign is going to be repaired.

**Parish Litter Pick** – collected ten bags on the morning of Saturday March 8<sup>th</sup> along with various larger items. Thank you to Niki, Helen, Sandra, Donna, Siri and her sons, Esther and John for undertaking the litter pick.

**Footpaths** – we have been in repeated contact with the Streetly Hall Estate about a number of footpath maintenance issues, including the collapsed culvert at Park Farm. We anticipate these outstanding problems should be resolved soon.

**The Wildwood Disco** - we have received reports on the noise levels for the Wildwood Festival for the last few years. All the recorded noise levels were said to be inside the organisation plan permitted limits.

**Bird Scarers** - it has been reported that these intrusive deterrents have caused more disturbance this year. We will raise this with the Estates concerned.

**Annual Parish Meeting** – This year's annual parish meeting will be on Friday 9<sup>th</sup> May at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. The meeting will include members of the County Flood Team who can advise us about how communities can protect themselves against flooding; we will also have a very senior representative from Stagecoach coming to hear about our perceptions of the 13 and X13 bus routes and timetables and the experiences of school students trying to travel to Linton or Cambridge. Watch out for the posters!

As you will be aware, GP surgeries and hospitals continue to experience increased patient demand. Between us all, we can help alleviate some of that demand by using alternative health services where appropriate.

Your local pharmacy can also offer treatments and prescribe medication for some conditions without you needing to see your GP. This service is called **Pharmacy First** and conditions that can be treated and prescribed for include:

- Earache (aged 1 to 17 years)
- Impetigo (aged 1 year and over)
- Infected insect bites (aged 1 year and over)
- Shingles (aged 18 and over)
- Sinusitis (aged 12 years and over)
- Sore throat (aged 5 years and over)
- Urinary tract infections or UTI's (women aged 16 to 64 years)

Don't forget, your local pharmacy can also help you with generalised pain and swelling, sore throats, bites and stings, headaches, constipation and diarrhoea, colds and flu, mouth ulcers, tiredness, and vomiting.

If you contact us with an eye problem, our reception teams may signpost you to the **Minor Eye Conditions Service (MECS)**. MECS is made up of a team of eye specialists who treat non-emergency eye conditions that do not need hospital attention. Conditions covered include acute red eyes, acute irritated or inflamed eyes, sticky discharge or acute watery eyes, in-growing eyelashes, foreign bodies in the eye and recently occurring flashes or floaters.

Finally, you can treat many minor illnesses such as colds and coughs, sore throats, and upset stomachs easily at home. Make sure you keep stocked up with health care essentials such as pain relief (paracetamol), cough and sore throat remedies, a first aid kit, upset stomach treatment, rehydration treatment and heartburn / indigestion treatment. Having these essentials at home will not only save you time, and help you feel better quicker, but will also help save the NHS much needed resources.

## CAMBRIDGESHIRE FIRE AND RESCUE SERVICE SAFETY INFORMATION

### Stay fire safe in your kitchen

More than half the fires our crews attend in the home start in the kitchen. This can be down to a number of things.

Below are some simple safety tips to help you stay fire safe in the kitchen:

#### Cooking safely

- Avoid leaving children in the kitchen alone when cooking on the hob. Keep matches and saucepan handles out of their reach to keep them safe.
- Take care if you're wearing loose clothing – this can easily catch fire.
- Keep tea towels and cloths away from the cooker and hob.
- Double check the cooker is off when you've finished cooking.
- Take care if you need to leave the kitchen whilst cooking, take pans off the heat or turn them down to avoid risk.
- Make sure saucepan handles don't stick out – so they don't get knocked off the stove.
- Keep electrics (leads and appliances) away from water.
- Check toasters are clean and placed away from curtains and kitchen rolls.
- Keep the oven, hob and grill clean and in good working order. A build-up of fat and grease can ignite a fire.

#### Don't let a garden spring clean lead to fire

Staying safe outside is just as important as keeping your family safe from fire in your home.

As the Spring time weather (hopefully) begins to arrive, many will take the opportunity to get out in the garden and give it a tidy.

There are a few simple things to do which will help reduce the risk of having a fire:

- Dispose of garden waste using either a local waste pick up service, or take it to a local recycling centre. Do not light a bonfire!
- Ensure cigarettes are completely out.
- Do not leave glass bottles lying on the ground – the sun's rays reflect through the glass and can start a fire.
- 

If you are planning to have a BBQ:

- Use barbeques on a hard, flat surface away from grass, shrubs or fencing.
- Put disposable barbeques on bricks, do not place directly on grass.

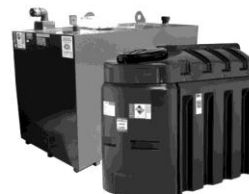

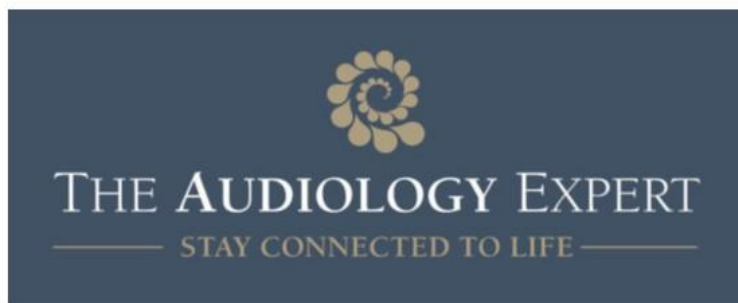
