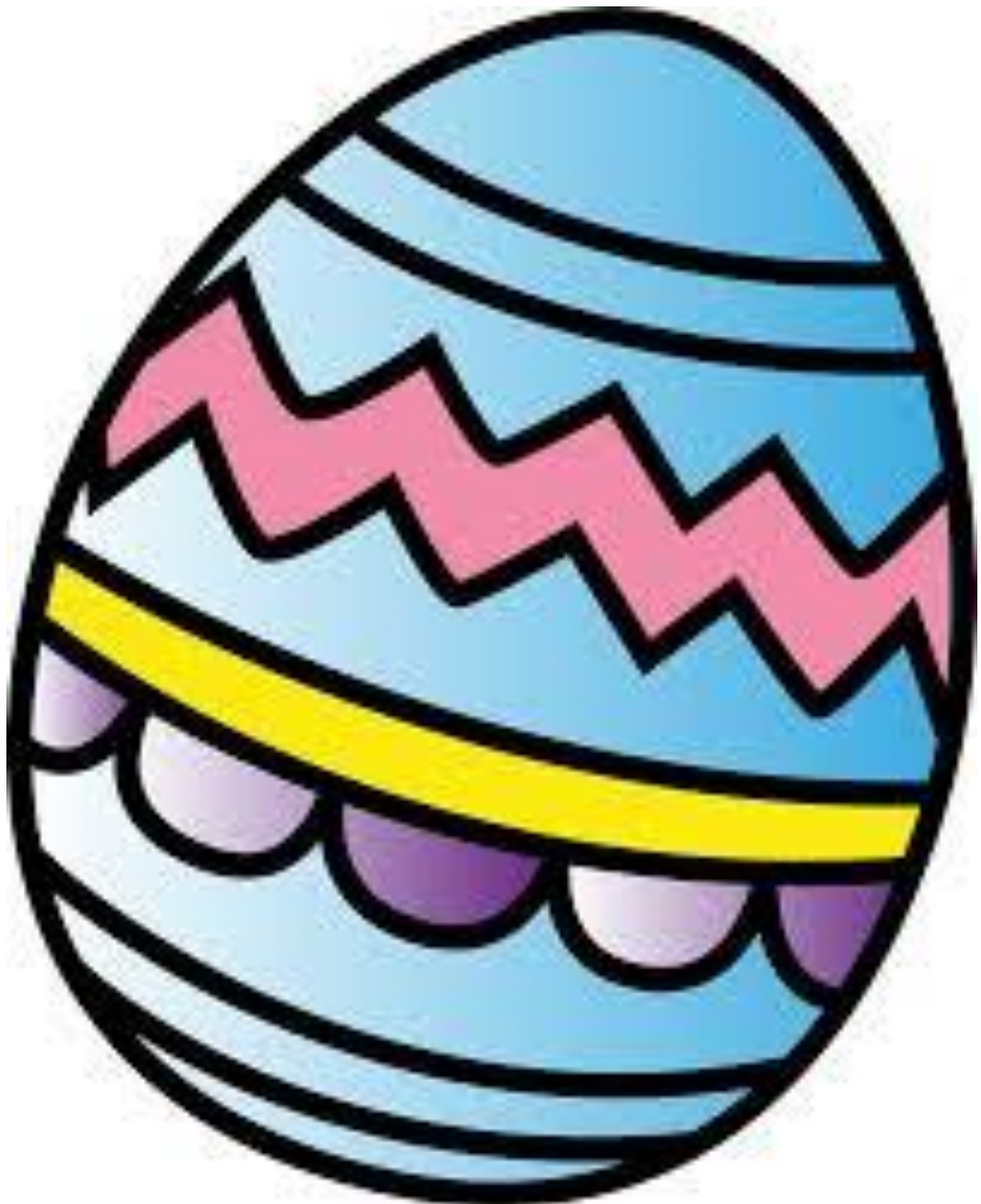


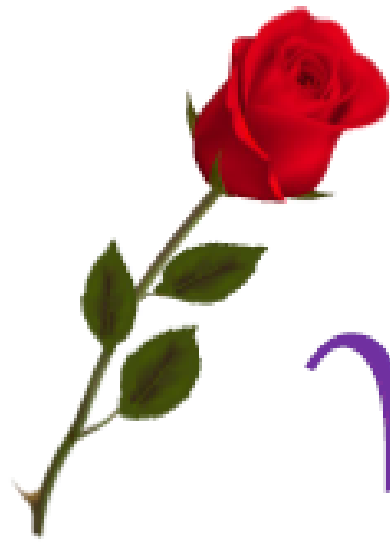

Dear friends,

Lent this year starts with Ash Wednesday on the 18<sup>th</sup> February. Lent is all about fasting but actually that is only one part of lent. The introduction to the Ash Wednesday Service tell us, *'since early days Christians have observed with great devotion the time of our Lord's passion and resurrection and prepared for this by a season of penitence and fasting. By carefully keeping these days, Christians take to heart the call to repentance and the assurance of forgiveness proclaimed in the Gospel and so grow in faith and in devotion to the Lord. I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy word.'*

So that's straight forward, isn't it? Well, it would be if we were all the same, at the same point on our Christian journey, but we're not.

We might take the common Lenten line of giving something up, chocolate, alcohol, television or whatever but where does that get us? As a stern Italian proverb put it *'who fasts and does no other good saves his bread and goes to hell.'*

We might commit ourselves to extra prayer time – but for what or whom will we pray in that time. We could aim to read the bible more – but which bits and why?

It really depends on what we want to achieve, where we want to be. What is the target of our Lenten discipline? Fasting and self-denial, prayer, bible reading are not in themselves targets; they are the means by which we achieve our targets which the introduction tell us is *'to grow in faith and in devotion to our Lord.'*

Growing in faith and devotion is something we can all do, but by how much depends on who we are and the point from which we start. Each of us needs to set our own targets for Lent. When Easter comes where do we want to be in our Christian journey? Which of the available resources, prayer, bible study, fasting and self-denial, Lent books, Lent study courses, church services etc, will help us get there?

When setting our Lenten targets, we need to be realistic, they should be attainable. We won't become super-Christians in the few weeks of Lent.

Setting yourself a target for Lent may sound like a daunting prospect, but help is at hand. It is one of the roles of the clergy to advise and direct in matters such as these, not just with the generalized advice contained in magazine articles like this or in the sermons we preach to 30 or so people at once,

but individually. During Lent I will be more than happy to talk to you about your Christian life, where you think are and where you want to go, so give us a try. Whether you do or not I pray that all of us can use this Lent to grow in faith and in devotion to our Lord.

A Parish Council meeting was held on Monday 12th January 2026. In attendance was our County Councillor, Henry Batchelor; 3 parishioners attended along with a representative from the Cricket Club.

**Public participation** – A parishioner enquired as to whether all Councillors were aware of all the communications the parishioner had had with Cllr John Howard and the Clerk since September 2025. They also asked if all Councillors considered the emails from the parishioner to be vexatious and whether Councillors were aware of the legal definition for vexatious emails. Councillors unanimously stated that they were aware of the communications and the legal definition; all considered the communications to be vexatious. Two other parishioner asked about the condition of the playground outside the Village Hall; the Chair agreed to write to Horseheath Village Community Association outlining the concerns raised.

**Horseheath Cricket Club** – have undertaken considerable work on the clubhouse in the close season but unfortunately have had another pipe leak in the cold weather and now need to lag and insulate all the loft space. They have commenced active fund raising in the form of their 100 club and new boundary advertising. The club were hoping the Parish Council could aid them in funding the new insulation as income is reduced in the winter. They have ambitious plans for the new season, with a darts team currently on Monday evenings, winter nets starting on a Sunday at Sawston, a second midweek team in league 5, junior coaching available in Horseheath and a repeat of the very successful 6 a side cricket smash scheduled this season for the August bank holiday weekend on Sunday 30<sup>th</sup> August. They are keen to attract new players and supporters of all ages and welcome any contacts from the community – club captain is Andy Edwards at [andy\\_edwards26@hotmail.com](mailto:andy_edwards26@hotmail.com).

The draft Cambridgeshire Local Plan is being consulted on until the 30<sup>th</sup> January – see

<https://consultations.greatercambridgeplanning.org/draft-greater-cambridge-local-plan-consultation>

This is important as it includes a proposal to build effectively a new small town of 6000 houses and supporting services at Grange Farm just north of Abington at the junction between the A11 and the A1307. The draft does talk about strengthening the green belt around Cambridge and continues to classify Horseheath as an infill village but it is important to provide some feedback with regard to local views on the proposed Local Plan. Please do look at it and comment.

**Kingsway Solar Farm** is undertaking a short targeted consultation until the end of January on proposed changes they are seeking to their plans. We encourage all parishioners to seriously consider this proposal which would greatly affect the countryside in South Cambridgeshire. We await a central government decision on the configuration of a **Unitary Authority** for Cambridgeshire, but South Cambridgeshire and Cambridge City merging is the preferred local option. Finally our area will not be receiving the new food waste caddy in addition to the green bins until September.

**Planning** – a new application has been received to change the fenestrations in the White House, West Wickham Road.

**Planning Enforcement** – Enforcement have been in touch with the developer of the property next to The Stables in Haverhill Road as none of the pre-construction conditions were implemented. It is unclear what will happen next to this site. There is no further information with regard to the signs at the bottom of Howards Lane.

**Cricket Club** – We congratulated the cricket club on all that they have achieved and agreed to support them in lagging and insulating the Clubhouse loft space.

**Alington Terrace bus stops and the A1307 path** –We have still not heard any proposals but continue to be aware of the possibility of us funding the new shelters which may require an increase in the precept in 2026.

**Horseheath Village Hall Playground** – we continue to engage with the Village Community Association to do all we can to support the renovation of the playground. The fence around the site is on permanent loan and it is hoped that the concrete at the front of the car park area can be used for a

bench. An application has been made to the Lottery to secure the funding necessary for refurbishment and the Community Association is endeavouring to keep the site tidy. The committee hope to be able to re-sand and stain the floor in the Hall this year.

**Cambridgeshire Local Plan** – We have contributed to the consultation and our comments are on the website.

**Village Sign** – The lettering has been re-gilded and we are hoping that the Crest will be restored soon.

**Horseheath Website** – we have been improving and adding to the website and would be pleased to receive comments on the site.

**Neighbourhood Plan** – because of the changes to planning regulations and the switch to Unitary Councils, in addition to the draft Local plan being recently released, we have not moved this forward in recent months. We are seeking clarity on the future of Neighbourhood Plans from the Shared Planning service.

**Elections** – the Parish Council will be holding elections in May. As well as current councillors, any interested party may stand. There are some conditions; for example you must be over 18 and live within three miles of the Parish. See <https://www.scams.gov.uk/elections/be-a-councillor> and <https://www.scams.gov.uk/elections/elections-2026> .

**Affordable Housing** – once again we have drawn a blank in terms of finding a suitable site for the 9 affordable houses it has been calculated that we need. We are seeking innovative and cooperative solutions by working with other villages and are waiting for Acre and the District Council to discuss our proposals.

**Speedwatch and Moving Vehicle Speed signs** – our sign is proving its worth. In December there were 3796 cars travelling along Linton Road into Horseheath. The majority did slow down when they saw the sign; the total number of cars speeding also appears to be reduced. Although 25% were travelling above 30mph, the majority of these were within 30-40mph with less outliers than in past years. Our thanks go to Niki Murray for managing the sign and providing the data.

**Community Litter Pick** – will be on Saturday 21<sup>st</sup> March from 9.30am until midday.

**Land behind the Village Hall** – we are appointing solicitors to represent the Parish Council the Horseheath Village Community Association so hope that the transfer and lease will be completed soon.

**Footpaths** - we continue to liaise with landowners to ensure paths are clear.

**The Glebelands** – We understand the s106 agreement has been signed but has not yet been made public.

**Budget and Precept** – We have considered our funds and reserves and produced a draft budget for 2026-7. We did not raise the Precept last year – it has been £18,590 since 2024. However, bearing in mind the prospect of possibly procuring new bus shelters, our support for village clubs and institutions, the likelihood of some legal costs for the land behind the Village Hall and the Glebelands we feel we should put it up to £20,000 for 2026-7. This is a 7.5% rise; over the last two years that averages 3.75% per year. We do not expect the rise to be significant for most homes.

**Our next scheduled meeting is Monday 9<sup>th</sup> March 2026.**

Happy new year from the Village hall committee

Thank you for all the support in the last year attending our events and hope to see you at our future ones planned this next year. We hope to run a monthly event with different variations.

In February we are running our first social night which will have the bar open, different games such as darts, board games and hopefully a community gathering. We are opening the hall earlier at 7pm to offer any questions on the hall, playground and look through plans we have and any suggestions for fundraising, signing up of any help and to allow everyone to meet us as the committee.

### **CAMBRIDGE FIRE AND RESCUE**

Here is some safety information to publish in your next magazine. Please feel free to get in touch if you need any further information.

#### **Get your chimney swept and keep your home fire safe!**

The Service attends around 100 fires a year involving chimneys, most of which could be avoided by following some simple safety tips:

- Appoint a skilled and technically competent chimney engineer. To find your nearest local HETAS Approved Chimney Sweep visit: <https://www.hetas.co.uk/find-chimney-sweep/>
- Keep the flue shafts clear and ensure they are well maintained

- Only use properly treated wood to build a fire
- Always use a fireguard to protect against flying sparks from hot embers
- Make sure embers are properly put out before you go to bed.

We always advise getting your chimney swept at least once a year, preferably before lighting it for the first time when the cold weather arrives. There could be a buildup of debris that's accumulated over the year, which can be set alight when heating the home and could cause a significant fire.

Some will also be looking at using a chimney for the first time, that may not have been used for many years. It is really important to make sure it is swept and inspect the brickwork before lighting it for the first time.

### **Stay fire safe in your kitchen**

More than half the fires crews attend in the home start in the kitchen. This can be down to a number of things.

Below are some simple safety tips to help you stay fire safe in the kitchen:

- Avoid leaving children in the kitchen alone when cooking on the hob. Keep matches and saucepan handles out of their reach to keep them safe
- Take care if you're wearing loose clothing – this can easily catch fire
- Keep tea towels and cloths away from the cooker and hob
- Double check the cooker is off when you've finished cooking
- Don't store items on top of hobs
- Take care if you need to leave the kitchen whilst cooking, take pans off the heat or turn them down to avoid risk
- Make sure saucepan handles don't stick out – so they don't get knocked off the stove
- Keep electrics (leads and appliances) away from water
- Check toasters are clean and placed away from curtains and kitchen rolls
- Keep the oven, hob and grill clean and in good working order. A build-up of fat and grease can ignite a fire.

On-call firefighters are a vital part of your fire and rescue service. They respond to a wide range of incidents, from fighting fires and attending road traffic collisions to rescuing people and animals in need. They also respond to medical emergencies.

In addition to responding to emergency incidents, on-call firefighters support their communities by providing a range of safety advice helping people to keep safe in their homes.

Being an on-call firefighter has many benefits. As well as being paid an annual wage and for the time spent at incidents or training, there are also opportunities to develop first aid skills and heavy good vehicle driving qualifications.

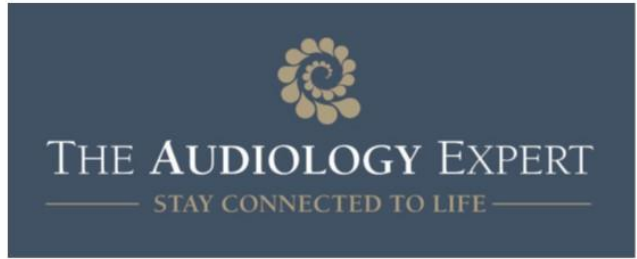

Any active chimney/flue (lined or unlined) should be swept at least once a year to ensure it is safe and working efficiently.
