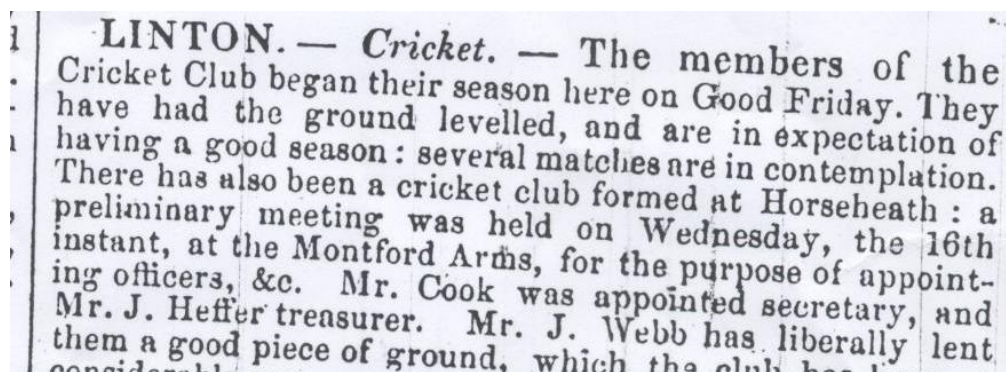
Horseheath Cricket Club

The earliest reference to cricket in Cambridgeshire was in Cambridge University in 1710, with some town clubs like Wisbech, Royston and Newmarket formed later in that century. The growth of village clubs really took off from 1820 to 1850 with over 60 being formed. The first mention of a Horseheath Cricket Club was in 1850 with this announcement in 'The Cambridge Chronicle' on May 11th.

SHUDY CAMPS AND HORSEHEATH

Cricket Club - A club has been formed by the above parishes, which bids fare to compete with any or all of the local village clubs in the county. We are glad to acknowledge the support of the Gentry in the neighbourhood and hope to see some interesting matches between this and other clubs.

There are reports of 2 matches played in that year by Shudy Camps, but with no mention of Horseheath – *see match reports overleaf*. However in 1851 there was a further announcement in the 26th April edition of 'The Cambridge Chronicle' about a Horseheath Cricket Club :



One of the match reports in 1851 calls the team 'Horseheath and Camps', with no mention of Camps thereafter. In the same year the club is referred to as 'Horseheath Park'. In 1865 there is report of 'Shudy Camps and Horseheath Cricket Club' which was formed in that year.

There are photographs of village teams in the early 1900's and in the 1930's (*see Archive photo albums*) but the club lapsed at some point and was re-constituted after WW2 in December 1946. There is a reference in the minutes at that time to 'the old club'.

Playing successes

The club joined the Weston Colville and District League in 1949 but was back playing friendlies in 1951 before joining the Cambs. Junior League Division 6 in 1953 and over the years gained promotions to Senior League Division 1, which they won in 1972 and 1988. Having been relegated from Senior League Division 1 in 2013, they were promoted back in 2020.

The club has won the Jack Hobbs Invitation Cup on four occasions in 1971, 1974, 1989 and 2021. Other cups and achievements include Junior Challenge Cup in 1966 and 1967; Walker Cup in 1970, 1974 and 1987; Senior League Division 2 in 1992 and 2005; with 9 Midweek League wins between 1973 and 1999 and 12 Midweek Cup wins between 1978 and 2022.

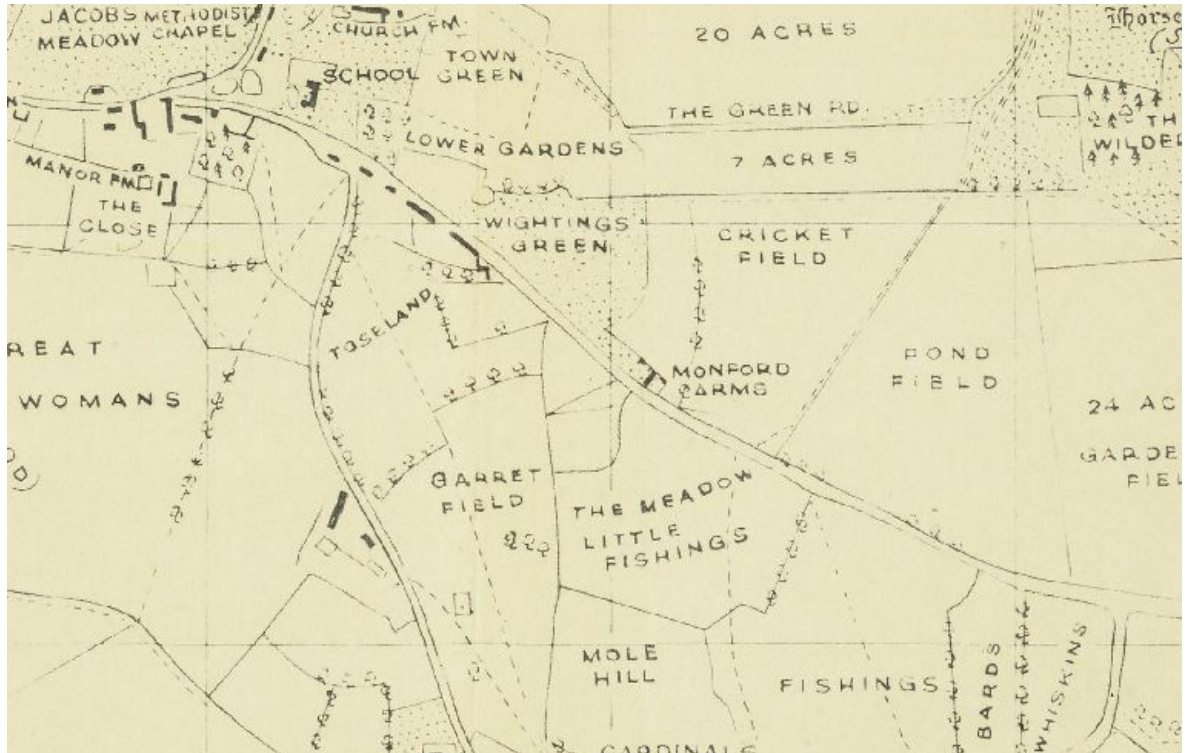

The cricket fields

The 1851 announcement mentions a field belonging to J. Webb who was the tenant at Church Farm. This may well be the same field as shown on a field map dated 1896 (*overleaf + see Map section in book 2 of Village Archives for full map*), which shows 'Cricket Field' to the east of The Monford (Montfort) Arms, just north of the main road. In 1868 there is mention of a cricket field 'by the turnpike road' (now Haverhill Road and A1307). The Club also played on a field called Pishings or Pigeons opposite The Montfort Arms, south of the main road, although on the 1896 map this field is called Fishings. About 1950 the Club leased the current field opposite the Village Hall from Manor Farm and erected a pavilion in the early 1970's.

Players

Vic Clarke started playing in 1946 and after playing for over 20 years acted as scorer, secretary, treasurer and chairman for 42 years. In the 1960's Derek Bradman played for Horseheath. He was related to the Australian legend, Don Bradman, whose family originated from Withersfield and whose great-great-grandfather, John, was born in Horseheath (*see article in 'Families' section*). Mick Ketteridge first played in 1963 and was still playing in 2017. He hit the club's first league century in 1979 during which he completed both his 50 and his 100 with 6's. He also plays for Cambridgeshire over-60's. In a remarkable double his brother Alan celebrated 50 years with the club in 2015.

A Meeting was held at the Red Lion on Friday January 31st 1947 at 8 pm, and eleven members were present including Capt Franklin, D Bowers, V Mayes, F Reader, J Reader, P Stinton, D Jacobs, V Blake, V Wandsworth, S Starns and C Brown, and it was decided to approach Mrs Parsons to obtain the money of the old cricket club, and all old records of the club. It was also decided to put an order in at Grays at Cambridge for the new equipment, required for the coming season, which includes 3 Balls, 2 Bats, 1 Pair of Wicket Keeping Pads, 1 Pair of Wicket Keeping Gloves, 2 Pairs of Batting Gloves, and 2 Sets of Bails, also Mr D Bowers asked Capt Franklin to inquire at Grays Cambridge to the cost of Practice Nets. It was decided to hold a dance in the Village School to raise funds for the club, at some later date, proposed March 1st 1947.

A Meeting was held at the Red Lion on Tuesday March 18th 1947 at 8 pm and eight members were present including Capt Franklin, Mr D Bowers, F Reader, J Reader, D Jacobs, V Selman, C Brown and V Blake, and Capt Franklin handed over a ten pounds war bond, and five pounds in cash from the old Horehath cricket club, and it was decided by all members present, to put the ten pounds war bond in Lloyds Bank Haverhill till some future date. Also it was decided to elect two members to go to Grays Cambridge to select the equipment needed for the coming season and Mr D Bowers, and Mr D Jacobs, were selected for this duty. It was proposed by Capt Franklin to approach Mr Shaw about drawing out a Third Party insurance, for the safe guard of the public on the highway, from getting injured with the ball, and the proposal was carried by all members present. Mr C Brown proposed that all members should get to work on the pitch, and it was decided to fence the pitch in on Wednesday night the 19th of March. Subscription was then taken, raising £15.0d. Meeting closed
